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Compulsory and Voluntary Trades

- There are over 55 Trades in Manitoba. Trades are classified as either compulsory or voluntary. When a trade is deemed compulsory it requires you to be registered as an apprentice OR you must already be a certified journeyperson in order to work in the trade in Manitoba. There are nine compulsory trades in Manitoba.
- The remaining trades in Manitoba are designated as voluntary. This means that apprenticeship training is optional for these trades and a person does not require a Certification of Qualification to work in Manitoba.
- A Certificate of Qualification is the credential you receive after successfully completing an apprenticeship program
 or challenging the exam as a trades qualifier. Certification means you can earn more money, have more job
 security, and better employment opportunities. It also enables you to pass on your knowledge to the next
 generation of apprentices through on-the-job supervision.
- In Manitoba, a certified journeyperson means a person who holds a Certificate of Qualification issued by Apprenticeship Manitoba or a Certificate of Qualification recognized under the Agreement of Internal Trade.
- Registered apprentice means a person who has signed a formal apprenticeship training agreement with his or her employer, and has registered that agreement with Apprenticeship Manitoba.

Apprenticeship Programs

Apprenticeship is a work-based post-secondary training program that leads to a <u>Certificate of Qualification</u> in a skilled trade.

Apprenticeship programs are work based (you earn while you learn) and the cost of training for the majority of programs is only \$400 - \$600 per year.









Most trade programs take 2-4 years to complete, and they combine approximately 80 percent paid-on-the-job training with 20 percent technical training in the classroom.

Once you successfully complete all three of these components in your specific trade program, you will receive a <u>Certificate</u> of <u>Qualification</u> in your trade.

Provincial and Interprovincial Trades

Provincial trades are those that are designated in Manitoba but are not Interprovincial Red Seal trades.

The standards for provincial trades are based on a Provincial Occupational Analysis, which is developed within Manitoba in consultation with industry stakeholders. In addition, the certification examination for the trade is a provincial exam.

Interprovincial trade is also known as a **Red Seal** trade. The Red Seal Program is recognized as the interprovincial standard of excellence in the skilled trades. The Red Seal endorsement indicates that the holder has met the national standards in the trade, and this certification is recognized throughout Canada without the need for further examination.



Experienced Tradespeople

There are **two types of experienced tradespersons**Apprenticeship Manitoba works with. There are those that want to challenge their exam and get their certification and there are those that want to work legally in Manitoba because they already have certification from another province or are former Canadian military.

Challenging your exam - If you have extensive experience working in the trade, you may be eligible to challenge the certification exam. Achieving certification in your trade can open up many opportunities and avenues for your career. Being approved to challenge means that individuals who meet the criteria for a trade will not be required to go through the full program. Instead, they will be allowed to become certified by writing and passing the final exam(s).



Experienced Tradespeople Apply to Challenge the Certification Exam

Experienced Tradespeople Trades Qualifiers - Approved to Challenge

Once approved to challenge the exam you will have up to one year to write the exam.

When you are ready to write the exam you will submit the exam application form and select the time and place where you want to write the exam.

If you do not pass the exam within the oneyear approval date, you will need to re-apply.

When re-applying you will have to submit a brand-new application, including your credentials, employer letters, work experience form, and assessment fee.

Financial Support

The Manitoba Government covers the major portion of tuition fees for apprentices when they attend technical/in-school training. This provides apprentices the opportunity to pay much lower tuition fees in comparison to most other post-secondary options. In some cases, employers may also choose to assist their apprentices with tuition fees and books, which makes an apprenticeship a cost-effective education alternative.






Alternative Careers for Electricians




